Come learn about creating innovative, inviting classroom environments that increase student buy-in and make going to classes feel like an experience for students who may be struggling outside the classroom. Helping students feel at ease in your classroom allows them to feel comfortable asking questions, discussing problems, collaborating with each other, and trying new things. Participants in this session will learn high-impact, budget-friendly ways to transform their schools' environment to excite and engage students, regardless of the subject matter. Jacy will share ways to evaluate available resources, find new or overlooked assets, and align talents to bring a plan to fruition-even within the confines of a strict budget. She will share stories, videos, and how-to tips and tricks from her rural Title One school's transformation into a version of Hogwarts that attracted the attention of JK Rowling herself!

Level up! Engaging Middle Schoolers in a Gamified Classroom

This is a session about creating a gamified classroom and its positive effects on student engagement in an ELA classroom. Jacy will share how she built an app for her students that has increased participation, encouraged teamwork, and rewards students without changing her current curriculum. Building the app is free, requires no coding skills, and takes little time away from instruction. All of the session participants will leave with a template for setting up their own app and an array of resources for adapting their game plan to fit their specific grade level and subject. Jacy will provide ideas and resources for conceptualizing a year-long or semester-long gaming theme and will share insights on working with an educational gamification and storification research project headquartered in Finland.

Play Time with Percy! Games That Make You Go "Ah!" (K-12)

Engage in a variety of fantastic cooperative games and super team building activities that will surely make you go "AH." The games and activities presented will fit all age groups from Kindergarten through high school [Percy even uses these with his college students, and they love them!].

Who's Teaching the Soft Skills to the Kids? (K-12)

As educators, we often wonder how our students will be successful in life after school. Teaching soft skills in our classroom provide opportunities for our students to practice and capture those skills that facilitate positive interactions with others and overcome challenges.

This session will explore many avenues to integrate and weave soft skills within our curriculum. Let's take the time to teach kindness, empathy, and respect. Let's look seriously at social and emotional learning as a real tool for a child's success!

Making the Connection: The Essential Triangle

This session is all about making the connection between family, child [student] and the school. The impact of engaging the "ESSENTIAL TRIANGLE" to maximize the successes of each child in school will be the main topic of discussion. The overall program will provide opportunities for discussion on what parents can and should do to be connected with their child's school community.

This session will present each participant with situations and scenarios that promote critical thinking skills and cooperative learning through collaboration with others. Centergize Your Classroom: Learning Centers in the Middle School Classroom

Have you been thinking about implementing stations in your classroom but aren't sure where to begin? This handson session will provide teachers in all content areas with some practical ideas for creating meaningful center activities, teaching students how to work in them, and manage them throughout the year.

Middle School Debate

We all know middle school students love to talk and love to argue even more. We also know that sometimes students struggle with how to present their arguments in a thoughtful, respectful way that leads to a deeper understanding of the views of others as well as their own. In this session, you will learn about strategies that provide a structure for argument and debate that will support students with learning how to communicate and learn from one another.

Questioning: Teaching Students to Monitor Their Understanding by Asking Higher Order Thinking Questions

Questioning is one of the best strategies we can use to help our students become better readers and thinkers. It is especially helpful when our students, not the teachers, are the ones who are asking the questions. This allows students to engage in monitoring their own understanding and challenging their own assumptions. Participants in this session will practice strategies that encourage kids to ask their own higher-order questions as they read and think. This session also lays the groundwork for Laura's Socratic Seminar workshop, though it is not a prerequisite.

The Power of Play: Using Games to Support Social/Emotional Learning in Young Adolescents

It would not be an understatement to say that this past year has challenged our students' social and emotional well-being more than ever before. This has been the case both for distance and brick and mortar learners. In this session, you will learn about games, strategies, and resources that will help build communication skills, encourage teamwork, and help students develop coping skills as they return to the classroom setting.

10 Things You Can Do with Gifted Students

Gifted students often have unique social/emotional and academic needs. It can often be difficult to meet those needs in large classrooms with learners who have a variety of needs. In this session, you will learn 10 strategies that can help address those needs in the classroom setting. Some of these strategies address the particular needs of gifted students while others will support the needs of all learners.

The Right Prescription: a dose of relationships, laughter, and networking

This workshop will capture the value of ensuring learners receive the Right Prescription throughout the school year (daily, weekly, monthly). The right dose of Relationships, laughter, and networking does the body good. Participants will be given different prescriptions to support and heal relationships, laughter, and networking issues.

Aspiring Leaders: The F.A.C.E.

F- flexibility

A- accountability

C- collaboration

E- execution

This workshop sessions is designed to support current leaders and those aspiring to become a leader. The FACE of leadership must stand the test of multiple "opportunities". Leaders are required to have their game FACE on each day. Participants will engage in round table discussions to share effective strategies and practices that can be implemented to support the mission and vision of the school.

What's Your Brand: Mirroring Classroom and School Culture

This workshop is design to show the importance of classroom and school culture alignment. The essence of a mirror is to see the reflection of what is in front of it. What is seen as the overarching vision and mission of the school should be reflected in the classroom. Each classroom is unique and thus must offer a unique experience. The brand of the teacher is the essence of who you are and what you offer. The quality of the "Brand" will stand the test of time.

Leading in the midst of a STORM

School leaders and teachers have the ability to guide students and other colleagues in positive directions. The role and responsibility of leadership rests in one's ability to build connections, relationships, embrace collaboration, and capitalize on networking opportunities. The ability to offer solid instruction and guidance for all stakeholders is paramount for leadership.

This workshop will capture the value of ensuring learners understand the power of positive thinking, calm reactions, and the need to be proactive when "STORMS" arise. Administrators, supervisors, teachers, and parents have the responsibility to help children prepare for uncertain and unannounced activities.

This meta-analysis of research will put your feet on a solid foundation and laser focus everything we do as educators to impact and accelerate teaching and learning.

Clarity in Teaching

What educator doesn't want to motivate students to learn, know what to teach and how to teach it, understand standards, and get more students to mastery? Developing clarity in teaching will achieve all of these when teachers and students answer these three simple questions. Did I mention clarity in teaching also doubles the rate of student learning!! Learn how to implement teacher clarity in your school or classroom and it's actually something you can start tomorrow!

Great Simple Ideas for Admin

As the Middle School principal in Conway, Arkansas, and as someone who has been in educational trenches for a very long time, Amy has collected and developed great ideas to share with you. Join her in a lively discussion regarding leadership/admin and all that revolves around it. She may even share her secret to staying so young! Come, sit, chat and discuss.

PICTURE THIS -- Students Finding Evidence to Defend a Claim

Writing is a tough thing for many students. Research assignments can be even more painful. This introductory lesson uses pictures books to help students learn how to 1) make a claim, 2) find evidence to support a claim, and 3) defend a claim using the evidence they found. This is a hands-on, practical session where participants will go through the process and come away with sentence starters and graphic organizers for classrooms of all ages.

From Listening to Understanding: Improving Classroom Conversation

Using Socratic Seminars and Public Deliberation is a great way to evaluate student understanding or have tough conversations. Come learn a framework for civil discourse: preparation, structure, norms, participation, and grading.

Building Relationships Through Clubs

Clubs are an excellent way to build relationships among students, and between teachers and students. In this session you will learn about the variety of clubs offered by schools which have successfully put this program into place, and you'll have the opportunity to ask questions about logistics, interact with other participants, and create a plan for implementation.

Differentiation, Enrichment and Remediation

When you have a wide range of ability in your class, how can you differentiate for all students? Come and learn ways to provide both enrichment and remediation.

Tech Swap: Apps for Online Work

Edpuzzle, Kami, Quizlet, Pear Deck, Nearpod, Jamboard (Google), Padlet, Mural, and Screencastify. Are you really good at one of these? Come on and share your expertise. Do you need to add one of these to your toolbox? Come on and learn some ways to use it. Let's share, learn, and experiment with apps that are useful for online classwork.

Mentoring: The Way to Grow and Keep New Teachers

Participants will examine materials that can be used for mentor programs and exchange ideas about how to develop a program that fits the needs of their school.

Building Equity in our Schools and Classrooms

This session will give light to how and what is necessary to consider equity in our schools and classrooms. From course selection to reward systems, we will analyze equity vs. equality and how our students can be affected. This session is designed to make you think outside the box and create situations of success for your school.

Dealing with Difficult Students and Parents

Do you have students in your classrooms who challenge you simply for the sake of a challenge? Do you succumb to the challenge? Or do you continue on the path of student success? This session will offer you the opportunity to meet several students who challenged the rules, the expectations, the dress code, the teachers, and the principal, DAILY. Learn how we turned those situations into positive experiences and survive the difficulties they present each day.

Admin Roundtable

Join Shannon in a lively discussion regarding leadership and all that revolves around it. This is an open forum to bring ideas and share concerns. Come, sit, chat and discuss.

The African American Male-Student's Guide to Great Teaching

Often, educators guess at what ALL students need to be successful. We try one strategy; it does not work; we try a different strategy; and it does not work. This session offers participants real insight into the minds of African American male students who answer this question for us: "What makes a great teacher?" You will be amazed at the answers, suggestions, needs, and desires from African American male students who range from honor students to those previously expelled. Are you looking for answers? We have them for you.

When Students Fight

Come join Shannon as she shares her insights and research on student fighting. When girls fight it is the worst thing to have to break up. Neither girl wants to stop fighting and that is obvious! Why black boys fight is revealed in the findings of a research project entitled "Violence-Related Offenses Among African American Males at the Middle School Level" (2003). This session is extremely relevant during this current climate of tension, where no one wants to compromise or back down.
